SAILING LEVEL:

Easier Sailing (Less Challenging):

Thassos: Generally sheltered and less affected by strong winds.

Lesvos (Lesbos): Offers many safe anchorages and is less challenging for sailing.

Samos: Generally calm seas and good anchorages.

Chios: Mostly sheltered, with manageable sailing conditions.

Northern Sporades (Skiathos, Skopelos, Alonissos): These islands are relatively protected and provide easier sailing conditions.

Moderate Sailing (Intermediate Difficulty):

Limnos (Limnos): Offers a mix of sheltered and more exposed areas, with moderate sailing challenges.

Ikaria: Can experience stronger winds, but there are several safe anchorages available. **Northern Sporades (Skyros):** Skyros is the southernmost island of the Northern Sporades and may experience stronger winds at times.

Agios Efstathios (Agios Efstratios): This small island is more exposed to wind and swell, which can make anchoring more challenging.


Challenging Sailing (More Difficult):

Samothrace (Samothraki): Samothrace can experience strong winds and swell, which can be challenging for inexperienced sailors.

Chalkidiki Peninsula: The northeastern coast of the Chalkidiki Peninsula may experience stronger winds and requires careful navigation.

Open Sea Passages: Sailing between some of these islands may involve open-sea passages with potential for higher winds and seas, especially during strong meltemi winds in the summer months.

Keep in mind that weather conditions in the Aegean Sea can change rapidly, and it's essential to consult local authorities and experienced sailors, as well as check the weather forecast before planning any sailing trip.




Kavala

Kavala is known as 'The Little Monte Carlo'. Historic, picturesque town, that impresses and excites every visitor. Sail to the beaches of the surrounding area and enjoy the local delicacies in the town's fish taverns. Also known as the Blue City and as the 'Mecca of tobacco', Kavala is a seaside city escape that effortlessly blends East and West's past and present. You are in a city where for centuries Byzantines, Ottomans, Jews, merchants, tobacco workers, refugees and intellectuals

Samothraki

The main town, built to be concealed from pirates, sits in a winding valley below Mount Saos, offering views of genuine beauty. Hike and explore Mount Saos where there are dozens of streams and pathways. A network of roads with innumerable waterfalls and hot springs may be found among deep forests and vast plains. Also discover the natural ponds known as "vathres". The beaches of Samothraki are less well-known, but they are certainly not lacking in natural beauty. "Pahia Ammos" has golden sand, Vatos has plane trees and clear waters, Kremasto has a waterfall that froths into the sea and Kipo has unique grey-black pebbles.





Chalkidiki

Chalkidiki is a region in northern

Greece known for its jutting peninsulas, which feature Mediterranean forests and sandy beaches in sheltered bays. The region has important archaeological sites like Stageira, known for its well-preserved mosaic floors. Pine trees along the beaches with their white sand, dreamy coves, turquoise waters and hidden coves. Some of the must-visit locations are the Kavourotrypes, Mikro Karidi, Megalo Karidi, Kalogria, Kriopigi, Sani and Agios Mammas.

Sporades Islands

The (Northern) Sporades is an archipelago in the north Aegean, close to the mainland city port of Volos. The group consists of 24

islands, four of which are permanently inhabited: Alonnisos, Skiathos, Skopelos and Skyros, but the sailing area includes the Pelion peninsula, the gulf of Volos and the northern part of Evia. These islands are the greenest in Greece (Skopelos is over 70% pine forest) and are famous for some of the best golden sandy beaches (Koukounaries) and isolated pebbly beaches (Lalaria) as well as being world famous as the setting for the Mamma Mia movie.








Lemnos

The principal town of the island and seat of the municipality is Myrina. In the past there was the belief that the grains from the volcanic soil of the island were miraculous. Today the land itself remains one of the most hospitable and at the same time unexplored in the Aegean. An island with a diverse coastline, golden beaches, impressive volcanic scenic landscapes. With rare archeological sites, castles, along with many traditional settlements. With sought after products since antiquity like the honey, the wine and the cheese and with hospitable inhabitants, Lemnos is

ideal, for those looking for a quiet vacation

and remote discoveries.
